Theme: Hawai'i's Past: Exploring our shared and unique pasts

Oli Workshop (9 - 10 am)

Join this workshop to learn about the history of Mānoa Valley by learning the chant "Welina Mānoa" composed by Kumu Hula and musician, Dr. Keawe Lopes. Through this workshop you will connect with UH Mānoa students, staff, faculty, and community members and explore your relationships with Mānoa. Come find your chanting voice with us, while we deeply listen to ourselves and the stories of others.



Historical Walk (10:15 - 11:15 am)

This historical activity will be an immersive walk along McCarthy Mall (we lovingly call Pilipili Pathway) featuring representation from some of the communities who have called Hawai'i home over time. As you visit each tent along the pathway we invite you to reflect on Hawai'i's history as well as your own. Come experience these stories with us at your own pace to learn more about Hawai'i as home across time.



Mele Workshop (11:30 - 12:30 pm)

Music is often a tool to capture the memories and histories of a place. Through this workshop, come learn a mele or song with us as a way to learn about Hawai'i's past and history! Musical implements welcome. No prior experience necessary.

Day 2: Wednesday- January 17, 2024

Theme: Hawai'i's Present: Practicing presence with self, others & 'āina





Ceremony 12 - 1 pm)

Please join us in ceremony. This will be a time of ho'okupu (offering) as we honor Queen Lili'uokalani at Ke Ahu o Kamaka'eha and will be followed by ho'okupu to honor Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr at his plaque near the Art Department. A chant, song, or lei would be appropriate to offer during this ceremony. If you are not accustomed to this practice, we welcome you to attend and observe quietly.

Workshop A (1:15 - 2:15 **OR** 2:30 -3:30 pm) Mālama 'āina (engaging with plants) with Nōweo Kai

Join this workshop with UH Mānoa Campus Arboretum Curator, Nōweo Kai, to huli ka lima i lalo (turn your hands to the ground) and learn how to take care of some of UH Mānoa's beautiful meakanu (plants). Prepare to get a tiny bit dirty and do some walking. Comfortable footwear and clothes are recommended. No prior experience necessary.



Workshop B (1:15 - 2:15 **OR** 2:30 -3:30 pm) Story sharing & radical listening with Sean Dunnington

Join this workshop with playwright and story coach <u>Sean</u> <u>Dunnington</u> to learn innovative techniques for writing and sharing parts of your moʻolelo (story) out loud. In particular, we will focus on moʻolelo that express your experiences of home. No prior experience necessary.

Pilina Circle (1:15 - 3:30 pm)

The Pilina Circle experience will be a 2-hour space where participants will share stories, listen deeply, and share connections. Pilina can be described as deep relationships, connections and interdependence with one another and 'āina or Grandmother Earth. Come re-discover your connections in the circle with us. This work is born out of the genealogy of Rx Racial Healing Circles and is driven by bringing people together to find their common humanity.


Day 3: Thursday- January 18, 2024
